Boosting Spirits: LCCC Students Pen Letters to Local Nursing Home Residents During the Holiday Season

As the coronavirus pandemic changes the way people gather and celebrate this holiday season, a group of students at Lorain County Community College is spreading cheer and compassion with those they think might need it most.

"We are writing letters for residents in a nursing home in Elyria," says LCCC student Madison Calvert. The Wesleyan Village nursing home is just a few miles from the main LCCC campus. Calvert, president of LCCC's Psi Beta Honor Society, contacted Barbara Hopkins, activities director at the home, and broached the idea. Hopkins loved it and now Calvert is one of five students in the honors group who has volunteered to send positive notes during this difficult time.

"I think it is so hard for certain

groups of people, especially in the nursing homes right now," Calvert says. "I know a lot of homes aren't able to let family come visit because they are at such a high risk, so we thought if there's anyone who needs a pick me up right now, it's those in nursing homes."

LCCC associate professor James Jordan, who co-advises the Psi Beta Honor Society with pro-

County Commissioners Grant \$150,000 to NR Community Care and CRS

North Ridgeville Community Care and Community Resource Services of Avon and Avon Lake were granted \$75,000 each at last Wednesday's virtual meeting of the Lorain County Board of Commissioners.

Commissioners granted each group the monies from CARES Act funding, catching both Pam Ohradzansky, Executive Director of CRS, and Heather Kaesgen, Executive Director or NRCC by surprise on the video call.

"Pam, I am crying for you," exclaimed Kaesgen as Commissioners Matt Lundy, Lori Kokoski and Sharon Sweda unanimously approved the CRS grant. "That is what social workers do - cry together!" she laughed.

Moments later, Kaesgen was tearing up again as the board unanimously approved a second \$75,000 grant for NRCC.

Both Kaesgen and Ohradzansky said it is the Food Pantries they host that see the most need.

"Last year, we distributed 113,000 pounds of food to 477 individuals," said Ohradzansky. "This year, we've moved through 110,000 pounds through November." Stocked through donations and food drives, CRS also belongs to Second Harvest Food Bank.

"Phenomenal for us is the support we have received from Avon Meijer's since continued on page 2

they've moved into town." They have donated \$50,000 in food only cards. "They understand what it means to be in a community and be part of a community," she added.

Clients, who qualify under minimum income guidelines, also turn to CRS to assist with energy bills (up 10 per cent this year), mortgage and rent assistance and car repairs, which have been on the upswing.

We have passed out 200,000 pounds of food this year. Our biggest program is our food pantry," said Kaesgen of the North Ridgeville Community Care services. "For the

first time in our history this year we had to purchase food for our pantry. We work closely with Second Harvest and they have been a Godsend to us.

We have seen 74 new families who have never seen a food pantry before, never had food insecurity before, and 2 business owners, one who has kept his business open but doesn't receive a paycheck so he can pay his employees. He comes to our food pantry for his own family. These are the stories we hear all day long. He has kept two single moms from going under."

NRCC once had 85 volunteers, all over 70, who are un-

able to work now because of safety considerations.

Heather's assistant (Daphne) and their husbands have made a pact to keep the center open, working about 70 hours a week because there is no staff at this time.

But, says Heather, there is a silver lining, even though community needs surged in September and October.

'It's been overwhelming but gratifying. Lots of silver linings. United Way, Trader Joe's, Giant Eagle, people from the community...

"I can't thank you enough."

A Message from Mayor Corcoran

With the holidays approaching and the number of COVID-19 cases on the rise, I would like to remind everyone the importance of mask wearing and social distancing. Governor DeWine recently signed a revised health order on November 17th as it relates to all public and private gatherings of greater than 10 people occurring outside a single residence are prohibited. We need to continue to follow these guidelines in order to get this pandemic under control.

Lorain County Public Health is a great resource for information. They recently released tips on how to reduce the risk of contracting COVID-19 during the holiday season. To lower your risk, celebrate with only the people you live with. If you plan to celebrate with



people you don't live with, here are several ways to reduce your risk of getting sick and protect others:

- Wear a clean mask at all times during the gathering except when eating. Wash afterwards.
- · Wash your hands and remind others to do so.
- · Limit the amount of time you spend with others.
- Sit physically apart. The more distance the better between people who don't live together.
- If sharing food, have each person use their own unused utensils to dish out their food.
- Have a clean-up plan to not crowd together in the kitchen.

Think you've been exposed? To protect others, be extra cautious for 14 days after the event:

- Stay home as much as possible.
- · Avoid being around people at high risk for severe illness from COVID-19.
- Consider getting tested for COVID-19 with a PCR test, 5+ days after exposure. Find a PCR testing site at www.LorainCountyHealth.com.
- · Pick up the phone when it rings your local health department calls all close contacts of confirmed COVID-19 cases.

fessor Michelle Foust, Ph.D., says the students came up with the idea after hearing about national letter-writing campaigns.

"We thought we'd take on our own campaign to help lift their spirits and give some joy," Jordan says.

Jordan says he and Dr. Foust have "sat back and watched" as the students use their writing to let others know that while they might be feeling alone, they are part of a community that will always support each other.

"I think that right now everyone has to come together; it's not just about us," says LCCC University Portrouble to tudent James Locals "Everyone to

sity Partnership student Jenna Leach. "Everyone feels alone now more than ever, so it's important that we help each other."

Randi Schmidt, also a University Partnership student, knows that helping others doesn't always take a grand gesture. Sometimes just a few small words can bring the biggest smiles.

"We sent our first group of letters last week and we received word back that the residents loved them and were really grateful, so we wanted to do it again," Schmidt says. "I write things like, 'just sending a reminder that you are loved' or 'people are thinking about you and care for you.' Just little affirmations."

Those little affirmations are going a long way. Hopkins says the letters, which everyone at Wesleyan Village calls "happy mail," have helped residents like Helen Vaughan feel tethered to the outside world during an isolating time.

"Helen is 98 years old and still enjoys hand-written letters," Hopkins says. "She was really impressed that 'those college kids' cared enough to hand write happy mail for our residents."

Jordan is impressed as well. Beyond the kind act fitting well with the Psi Beta Honor Society's goal to give back to the community, it fits well with his students' compassion for those in need.

"They're not doing this for a grade or to remain a member of Psi Beta," Jordan says. "Our students are caring about the community of Lorain County and people in nursing homes who could use a little lifting up."



Message from the Superintendent

Dear Parent/Guardian,

At the Tuesday, December 1 Board of Education meeting, I shared a summary of the results of the community and staff surveys that were launched in October regarding second semester planning. Based on the survey feedback received and the divided results, in addition to guidance from Lorain County Public Health, I have recommended that we continue our current hybrid model to start the second semester.

The reality is that under the current circumstances a return to full in-person learning five days a week is not practical because of a shortage of certified and support staff substitutes. Also, we do not have the physical space to properly distance students, regardless of whether we chose a three or six-foot standard.





Additionally, with the increasing positive case counts of COVID-19 and the number of staff and students required to quarantine, it would not be possible to staff our buildings in-person five days per week. Currently, we are only able to continue our hybrid model because teachers are able to work remotely while quarantined.

We continue to evaluate every option available to the district. This was a very difficult decision to make and I understand that it will not meet the desires of everyone. We understand that it has been a challenging year and I cannot thank you enough for the sacrifice, flexibility, and support you have shown.

Fire Department Offers Emergency Medical Identification Cards

The North Ridgeville Fire Department has teamed up with the North Ridgeville Senior Center and University Hospitals of Cleveland to offer Emergency Medical Identification Cards to our residents. The cards can be obtained by residents and filled out to include emergency information such as doctor's name, existing medical conditions, medications, allergies and other medical information that can be useful in an emergency. The card then slides into a magnetic sleeve that should be kept on the refrigerator. This is especially useful in times of an

emergency when the paramedics respond to the home. If this information is readily available, it streamlines the process of obtaining information when a patient may not be able to supply it themselves. These cards are free and can be picked up at City Hall and both fire stations.
