How many lights are there? Bob himself isn't sure anymore. Bob invites the curious to count them if they dare!

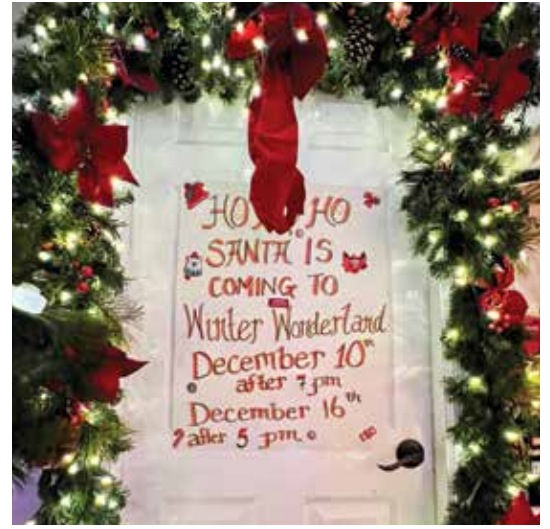
Work starts in September and continues through October as he gets ready to flip the switch when November rolls around.

## NRHS Skeet Shooting Champs Honored in Senate

State Senator Nathan Manning (R-North Ridgeville) recognized members of the North Ridgeville High school state skeet shooting champions in the Senate chamber. The team won the 2022 Ohio State High School Clay Target League Skeet Championship in June. Junior Lillian West won the individual state skeet championship and senior Vanessa Donato won the individual state trap championship.

West also won the national ladies championship at the USA Clay Target League nationals in trap shooting in July. Sophomore Jessie Scott barely lost a tie-breaker for the boys title after hitting 199 out of 200 targets.

"This is a remarkable achievement," said Manning. "World class marksmanship requires tremendous mental focus and concentration, which will greatly help these students succeed no matter what career they choose to make their mark."

North Ridgeville's club team was founded in 2017 with 19 shooters. It has grown to 70 athletes, approximately 30 percent of whom are female. This is the first year in which there was a female division in the national championship, making West the first girl ever to be crowned the best shooter in the country.

## Letter to the Editor

### Where Do We Go from Here?

#### NR Can't Just "Do Better"

With the recent defeat of the bond issue in NR, I think it is important we consider what things impact student performance.

New facilities do not attract better families, smarter kids or better teachers. Teachers, like any profession, are trying to make a living, and many factors impact whether you choose to "fight or flight" when building your career. NRCS has many amazing educators I have worked alongside for 20+ years. They have dug in and decided to call NR home for the duration of their career (after 5-7ish years in a district, especially with a masters degree, most teachers are "too expensive" to hire in other districts). There are other teachers who experience the challenge of 1. facilities or 2. lack of community support and decide they don't want to endure NR for the long haul, and no one blames them for that "flight" that occurs within those first few years of a new teacher's career.

The point is not that we are comparing apples to oranges when you look at the success of other districts in terms of student performance, but WHY they are able to build schools and programs that are successful.

**High performing districts are continually supported by their communities.** They value keeping competitive programming,

up-to-date facilities and yes, competitive teacher pay. Yes, parent involvement is important. But maintaining teachers is just as critical. We have some of THE BEST who have stayed here to "fight" for NR to be a successful district and they are doing good every day.

The challenges of providing curriculum to meet the needs of all learners and SPACE to provide these interventions is just the smallest piece of the bigger problem. We need our community to look at the challenges we are facing as a district from within the walls of the schools and maybe talk with staff to get a different perspective on why we are failing our students. And before you read that as "the teachers are failing our students" please know that I mean why the COMMUNITY is failing our students with every no vote that was cast last month.

We can't expect our district to just "do better" with subpar facilities and lack of funding for operations. The people that say, "the building looked that way when I was there in the 80s" were living in a different time. TWO lab rooms to service 1200 students? And you want our kids to graduate as leaders of science and technology?? HOW CAN THEY?? The best science teachers on the planet can be employed by NRCS but how are they instructing on 21st century learning in facilities that were built in the 1960s? The disparity between the learning that can occur at NRAC due to flexible spaces and the limita-

tions placed on NRHS cannot be denied.

Screaming at an athlete to "do better" isn't going to improve their performance without the coaching, training and equipment needed to improve their game. Why does the community think they can expect our district to "do better" with exactly what they have?

Finally, the fact that there is still a perception that a performing arts center is astounding. Pictures of the space given to our drama students to perform a high school play from a Kindergarten stage have been shared with our community. God bless every one of those students and staff members for having the tenacity to even want to continue to provide that experience for our students and yes, this community, because it is absolutely appalling. It could probably even be argued that in most districts with a PAC, the PAC gets more use than a football stadium. And before we talk about how the stadium was not a "need", I'd like to remind the community that our old stadium was on the old middle school property. Our own football, band and cheerleaders were bussed to their home field because it was not on the site of the high school. Some people try to skew facts and build a case for something that wasn't the least bit controversial. The new stadium was needed then, new schools are needed now. A performing arts center is long overdue.
