Bryan Morgan Takes Helm as Head Ridgeville **Football Coach**

On January 19, 2021, Bryan Morgan became the new North Ridgeville High School head varsity football coach after Board of Education approval. Morgan replaces Luke Durbin who stepped down in November 2020 after coaching for seven years.

"I am very excited for this new chapter in my coaching career. This will give me an opportunity to have an impact on a larger part of the North Ridgeville community," Morgan said. "My staff and I are going to work to ensure a positive culture that is full of enthusiasm and commitment. The last nine years as the head

varsity basketball coach has been a great experience and I had the chance to work with amazing colleagues. I appreciate the North Ridgeville City Schools for giving me the opportunity to lead the varsity basketball program.

Morgan currently works at North Ridgeville High School teaching physical education and health. He has been working for the North Ridgeville City Schools for 11 years.

Commissioner Michelle Hung Creates Veteran's Commission

Dear North Ridgeville residents

The first 6 weeks as Lorain County Commissioner and President of the Board have been busy and exciting. I am pleased to announce after reviewing the CARES Act expenditures spreadsheet, I noticed that there were significant allocations made to the Veterans, but the payments had not been made. After



investigating the matter, it was found that the previous Board pulled the money back from the Veteran's. Upon review, the CARES Act money was still available to the Veterans Commission and I created a resolution to distribute the funds. Checks for a total of \$288K will be going out to the Veteran's Commission in the next 2 weeks that can be used for the services they provide.

We have a history of providing our Veteran's Commission with the funds they need that provide critical services for them in Lorain County. A few of the things they provide is helping Veteran's get to medical appointments such as dialysis, heart procedures and routine care. They employ several drivers who provide rides and stay and wait with them while they are at their appointments. The Veteran's Commission provides transportation, financial assistance, housing assistance, grocery voucher assistance and gasoline voucher assistance for Veteran's seeking employment. The Lorain County Veterans Service office also has computers available for Veteran's to work on their resume and job placement assistance.

The 3-year approved budget history of our Lorain County Veterans Service Commission is as follows: 2018- \$2,503,700.00 2019- \$2,458,200.00 2020-

For 2020, the Veteran's received a budget of \$2,583,200.00 and the additional \$288K of CARES Act Funds, for a grand total of over \$2,871,200.00. In Lorain County, we have, and always will take care of our Veterans.

As the health and safety for our volunteers and clients is paramount we have made the difficult decision to change the way we will be serving our clients

We will be open, but we will not have any volunteers at the center. Therefore, all food distribution will be a pass through at our side door.

As another precaution, for the time being we will only accept monetary and food donations: canned, fresh, frozen.

We are also accepting essentials items: shampoo, toilet paper, paper towels, hand soap, etc.

We provide these programs to a range of clients including singles, families and seniors.

Once approved, based on guidelines of household size and income, the following programs become available to them at no cost to the client.

Food Pantry: Part of our facility is our food pantry which provides complete and balanced meals to our clients with sufficient food to accommodate all persons living in the home. It is our philosophy that regardless of parental lifestyle, if there are planned meals in the home the children will not go hungry and may also benefit in other ways from the familial value of an organized mealtime. If someone is in immediate need of food and they are not one of our pre-approved clients, our policy is to give them "emergency food" from the food pantry and have them complete an application form for future needs.

Clothing and Household Items: We provide our clients with gently used clothing, laundered by our volunteers, and made available on a daily basis. The clothing is donated by persons in our community. Household items are also donated, and special needs are met whenever possible such as requests for beds, cribs, household furniture, etc.

Utility and Housing Assistance: In order to provide our clients another opportunity to maintain reasonable living accommodations, we assist with utility and rent payments. Clients are allotted \$100 per calendar toward rent/mortgage payments after providing proof that they have received no financial assistance from any church, governmental agency, charitable institution or relative for at least four months. They are also allotted \$100 towards utility assistance (i.e. electricity and/ or gas) per calendar year. When a client requests assistance, we are able to send the necessary funds directly to

utility companies and/or landlords to ease the economic burden that many families have had to shoulder in recent years. We have been proud to pioneer this unique service for clients which, since 1989, has prevented countless utility shut-offs and evictions. New clients are eligible for this program after one month.

Dairy: We provide milk, eggs and butter to our clients. The essential nutrition of dairy products is especially needed for the development of our young children.

Layettes: When a baby is born to one of our clients, the parent is presented with a layette of personally purchased items including diapers, "onesies", booties, a sweater set, blankets, bottles, a baby toy, a stuffed animal, and baby hygiene products.

Summer Lunches: Five lunches per week are offered for school age children who have been on a government funded school program which ends with the school year. Their eligibility is qualified by the North Ridgeville City Schools. Food is purchased in bulk and then packaged and distributed by volunteers.

School Supplies: Required school supplies are purchased and distributed to school age children. We feel it is important for all children to begin the school year on an equal footing with their classmates, and to better enable them to focus on their studies in the year ahead, dignity intact.

Easter Baskets: Easter Baskets full of candy and small toys for children 10 and younger are distributed to our client families along with a box of food for Easter dinner, including a ham, spring vegetables, sweet potatoes, pie, and eggs for coloring.

Thanksgiving Baskets: Each Thanksgiving we

receive donations of turkeys and other food items for Thanksgiving. The week before the holiday, we offer baskets containing an entire meal complete with a turkey.

Christmas Store and Adopt-A-Child Program: Every Christmas we request donations from the community for new gift items: brand new toys, clothes, games, etc. We place all of these items by category in our specially designated "gift shop" area and, prior to Christmas, invite our clients to shop (with no money) for their family members and loved ones. We also ask our clients to fill out Wish Lists which we pass on to people in our community who would like to "adopt" a child or family for Christmas. Each year we make every effort to ensure that every client with a Wish List receives gifts for Christmas.

Emergency Prescription Financial Assistance: With the prescription expertise of a local pharmacist, we can offer immediate and/or temporary medication. Sometimes there is an urgent need that cannot wait on a free clinic and must be addressed immediately.

Essentials: Twice a month items that are needed on a daily basis, which are taxable but not covered by Food Stamps, are offered to our clients. These essentials include personal and hygiene products such as tooth-paste, soap, shampoo, laundry detergent and cleaning supplies as well as paper products like towels, Saran wrap, aluminum foil and toilet paper.

Community Care Garden: Volunteer men and women from the community, with the help of a local farmer and his wife, have coordinated local plots of land throughout the city in order to grow produce to donate and distribute to our clients. We believe it is a great blessing to be able to offer fresh, in-season vegetables to our clients
