

## North Ridgeville High Grad Jordan Sas Finds her Path to Affordable Degrees Through LCCC's SAIL

Growing up in a single-parent household, North Ridgeville High grad Jordan Sas and her mom talked a lot about the importance and the realities of attending college. From those conversations, she knew attending a four-year university was a non-starter.

"I always understood that finances would play a big role in my decision," Sas said. "I knew pretty early on that I would need to take responsibility for figuring out scholarships, choosing an affordable path, and making smart decisions."

It was during her time at North Ridgeville High School that Sas learned what her smart decision was. She had an affordable, direct path to a bachelor's degree at Lorain County Community College. Sas had taken several LCCC courses through College Credit Plus, which allows high school students to enroll in classes at LCCC and receive dual credit for high school requirements and for college credit. Early ex-

posure to LCCC led Sas to the college's University Partnership program which gives students access to bachelor's and master's degree programs from several four-year universities at a fraction of the cost.

"Choosing LCCC and the University Partnership was not just an academic decision, it was a financial and personal necessity," Sas said. "Both made it possible for me to earn the degree I wanted from the school I wanted, at a cost that fit my situation."

After her 2022 high school graduation, Sas began working toward her Bachelor of Business Administration degree from Kent State University through the University Partnership. She graduated in May 2025 and along the way, earned two associate degrees from LCCC. Today, Sas is working on her next degree—this time a Master of Business Administration from Kent State University.

Sas said all these degrees were in her

## Community Garden Dates Announced

Spring is in the air and it's that time of year to start thinking about the 2026 gardening season. The North Ridgeville Community Garden is open to all North Ridgeville residents. Applications for plots will be accepted from **Monday, April 20 through Friday, May 8**. If you had a plot last year, you will be able to have that same plot this year and then the additional open plots will be assigned on a first come basis.

This is the 16th season for the project, a partnership with the City of North Ridgeville. The garden is located along Chestnut Ridge Road across from alternate State Route 83 at the roundabout. The two-acre garden has 95 plots, each measuring 20 feet by 15 feet. The plot fee is \$20. North Ridgeville Community Care also has an area measuring 75 feet by 125 feet at the west end of the garden. The field will be plowed up by a local farmer in the Spring and then the plots are marked and laid out by volunteers. The plots are usually ready for planting by Memorial Day as long as Mother Nature cooperates.

Free water is supplied to each plot via a system of hoses connected to a main water source. A large tiller and a variety of garden tools are available to maintain the plots. Each gardener plants and cares for their own plot. Extra produce is donated to the North Ridgeville Senior Center and can

be put in a labeled bin near the east end sheds.

Applications and guidelines will be available starting on **April 20** and will be posted below and available from the Mayor's Office at City Hall between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

reach because of LCCC's affordability and accessibility. Beyond that, her participation in an LCCC support program called Students Accelerating in Learning (SAIL) was a game changer. SAIL takes a holistic approach to student success, combining financial, academic, and career planning support for students. The program, which has been recognized nationally as a best practice in community college student success, offers scholarships, book vouchers, and monthly gas and grocery assistance.

In addition to financial support, SAIL students have monthly academic advising check-ins and integrated career and transfer advising. Sas' career and academic advisement professional, Whitney Houglan, said the advising reaches well beyond course load.

"Academic advising not only helps with scheduling and completion, but we are here to talk about life, the good and the bad," Houglan said. "We are here to bring some joy and light through a stressful time."

Houglan said she gets to know her SAIL students well over their time in the program and, in turn, becomes a familiar constant in their lives. Her presence made a big difference in Jordan's journey.

"SAIL was one of the most impactful parts of my experience at LCCC," Sas said. "My advisor, Whitney Houglan, was an incredible source of support throughout my journey. Her encouragement, guidance, and willingness to help made a lasting difference in my college experience and helped me stay confident and motivated."

Sas, who's been working as an accounts

receivable clerk at Shurtape Technologies in Avon for two years, plans to use her degrees to move into higher-level roles in finance or accounting.

"My long-term goal is to continue growing in the business field while creating financial stability for myself and my family," Sas said.

Sas said that without LCCC, the University Partnership and SAIL, she's not sure she would be where she is today— a 22-year-old with three degrees earned and her sights set on more.

"Without LCCC's affordability, flexibility, and support services, achieving my degree would have been extremely difficult," she said. "Instead of having to choose between work and school, LCCC allowed me to do both—and succeed."

## From Plan to Progress

Our city's master plan is coming to life, one achievement at a time. Look for From Plan to Progress updates to see how we're turning master plan recommendations into results.

### Preserve or acquire land for employment uses.

As outlined in the city's master plan, a key priority is to preserve and prepare land for business and industrial uses to support growth and strengthen the local tax base.

The city has recently closed on property that will be combined with a previously acquired and rezoned 46-acre industrial site. Together, the combined property creates a larger and more attractive opportunity for future development. Beginning this month, Council will consider rezoning the newly acquired portion to match the existing industrial zoning and support a unified site.

This effort reflects the master plan's guidance to prepare sites for employment uses by assembling land, aligning zoning and planning for infrastructure. The city has plans underway to extend sanitary sewer service to the site, further improving its readiness for future development and helping attract a range of high-quality end users.

By continuing to invest in site readiness and infrastructure, the city is helping create the conditions for future job growth, private investment and long-term economic strength.

## Trees at Work: Natural Stormwater Solutions

As Arbor Day and Earth Day approach, it is a good time to reflect on the important role trees play in our community. In addition to their beauty, trees provide essential environmental benefits.

During a rainfall, trees act as natural umbrellas. Their leaves and bark capture and hold water, slowing the rate at which it reaches the ground. Depending on the size and species, a single tree can store 100 gallons or more of water before becoming saturated. Across a community, this adds up quickly.

This process, known as stormwater interception, helps reduce runoff by an estimated 2 to 7 percent annually. When combined with natural landscaping, that reduction can be even greater – sometimes managing most or all rainfall on site. By slowing and absorbing water, trees help limit flooding, reduce strain on drainage systems and lower long-term infrastructure costs.

Tree roots also play a critical role below the surface. They stabilize soil, filter pollutants and help recharge groundwater, which supports drinking water supplies for many communities.

Planting and maintaining trees are simple and powerful ways to protect our environment and support long-term sustainability. This Arbor Day, consider how even one tree can make a meaningful difference.
