North Ridgeville Branch Library Bike Share Program

The North Ridgeville Branch Library has started the bike share program! The bike share is made possible by the Heart and Sole Collaborative, coordinated through Lorain County Public Health and powered by the United Way of Greater Lorain County, in partnership with the Lorain Public Library System.

Beginning today, the North Ridgeville Branch Library has two Adult Electra Townies 7D available for check out with an LPLS library card. Adults can check out a bike for a day to enjoy a scenic ride. Townies are recreational ride-around-town bikes that are ideal for paved paths. The Library has both a step-over bike in nickel and a step-through bike in palm green. A step-through frame (also known as open frame or low-step frame) is a type of bicycle frame with a low or absent top tube or crossbar. It can accommodate a variety of height levels. In addition to the adult bicycles, the North Ridgeville Branch Library will also circulate adult bike helmets, bike locks, and bike lights. The bikes will circulate during warmer weather months. This year, we hope to circulate them through September and early to mid-October weather permitting.

Adults, 18 and over, will need a valid library card and photo ID to

check out a bike.

Community Care Update

Since the shut down in March, North Ridgeville Community Care has managed to stay open, serving our clients throughout the pandemic. The increase in new families each week keeps rising, most never receiving food from a pantry before. We are serving approximately 60 families a week. Since the shutdown, we have served over 2,500 people and distributed over 100,000 pounds of food.

Many of our clients are senior citizens, and they are nervous about shopping. They have health problems, along with physical constraints. We

have managed to keep most of them out of the stores by providing them with two weeks of groceries and household items each time they visit us.

Thanks to our sewing volunteers, ALL of the kids are masked up for school. Mary Elchlinger, Bev Behrns, Barbara Kramer, and Jean Beckner have been sewing up a storm. They have been making masks for our clients and all of you since the pandemic has started. With all their donations from the masks, they have donated over \$3,800. We can't thank these ladies enough and all of you for generously giving to this great cause.

We are so fortunate to have such a wonderful group of volunteers that run our Community



Care Garden. They will have planted, cultivated and harvested over 4,000 pounds of food for our

Our most significant need right now continues to be monetary. We are purchasing food from Second Harvest, which not only allows us to get exactly what we need but is already sorted and ready to go out to our clients.

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
O'Neill Healthcare: Drive-Thru Lunch & Learn



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Election Information

To register to vote in Ohio or update your registration address online, go to www.olvr.ohiosos.gov (Ohio Secretary of State Website). A link to this site can also be found on the Lorain County Board of Elections website (www.voteloraincountyohio.gov). You must register or update your voter registration no later than 30 days prior to an election. Since the General Election is November 3, you must do this by October 5, 2020 to vote in this election.

Absentee Ballot Request forms can be printed from the Lorain County Board of Elections site. FYI, absentee ballot request forms have been sent to all registered Ohio voters by the Secretary as well as some other organizations have sent them. You will need to complete the form and return to Lorain County Board of Elections, 1985 North Ridge Rd., East, Lorain, OH 44055.

Once you submit your absentee ballot request, you can track your absentee form as well as the mailing of your ballot and the receipt of your ballot by the Board of Elections on their website. They are not permitted to begin mailing of ballots until October 6th for the November 3rd


The United States Postal Service estimates first class mail may take 2 - 5 days for delivery so you will not want to delay in sending or requesting your form or ballot. You can also deliver absentee ballot form or ballot directly to the Lorain County Board of Elections. (Drop box is available at the site 24/7 & is monitored by video surveillance.)

The plan right now is to have polling places open for voting on Tuesday, November 3 but as you know with COVID, things change daily. The normal hours for voting are 6:30 a.m. - 7:30 p.m. on that day. In person voting begins on October 6 at the Lorain County Board of Elections office. Hours and additional information can be found on their website.

Please do not request an absen-

tee ballot if you plan to vote in person as you would have to complete a provisional ballot at the polls which may or may not be counted.

Poll workers are greatly needed throughout Lorain County in order to staff polling places. They get paid for their time, defend democracy, and help make this November a successful election. You can apply to be a poll worker on the Lorain County Board of Elections website.
